



As a travel photographer the **NEXTO-DI backup device** is an essential part of my kit –to travel without it would be unthinkable to me. I have tried several makes of portable storage devices and in my view it is by far the best available. Why do I

like it so much? – Several reasons – its very easy to use, very fast at downloading, available with a 500 gig hard drive, good battery life and is small enough that I can fit to in the back compartment of my bumbag,



On a two month trip I travel with 4 – two are kept in my bumbag and two in a lockable Peli case in my rucksack (all 4 will fit in a small peli case) – the second two act as backups to the first two, and by keeping them in two different places hopefully if one get stolen I will still have a backup copy.

Recently I upgraded to a **NEXTO Video Storage** (ND-2725) and I was impressed by the longer battery life – that certainly came in useful on my recent trip to Colombia when I camped in Tayrona National Park and had no access to electricity. But what really impresses me is the downloading speed of this device. Using the **NEXTO-DI** means I can download my images in a fraction of the time it would have taken me with my previous devices. – and

when you need to get up at 4.30am for dawn shots you really don't want to be up half the night waiting for images to download!
